Letter from Catherine Beaumont Christmas: Let's prepare for the celebration.

I enjoy the anticipation for Christmas. The Christian season of Advent is from 1 December to 24 December and Advent means 'coming', so we wait for the coming of Jesus. My children, despite being teenagers, still want Advent calendars and I love having an Advent candle to count down the days. I know that Christmas can feel pressured as we try and remember everything we need to buy and prepare, but I invite you all to take some time each day to think about its spiritual significance. Delia Smith's book, 'A Feast for Advent', gives us not recipes but readings for each day of Advent. I also recommend the website 'sacred space.ie' which has a daily reading, prayer and reflection. It only takes 5 minutes.

The story of Jesus' birth is so amazing: it is a story of God made ordinary, becoming a child for us. Jesus was born in a stable into an ordinary family who suffered like us. His family had to flee danger soon after he was born, but Joseph, Mary and Jesus took care of each other as families do, in amongst the danger. It is a story of hope for goodness in a difficult environment, the triumph of human relatedness and love over a dark and unkind world. From this we have evolved rituals and customs about being with people that we love, bringing gifts, being charitable to others and offering prayers for the world and for our own protection.

When Christmas is over, we may feel disappointed and sad (or even relieved!), but remember we can celebrate the 'gift' of Jesus every day. To do so enriches our lives as we live in gratitude for that gift and for all the blessings that God has given us. What is that gift of Jesus? It is of comfort and hope – for all of us -when we face difficulties, it is of care and love in an uncaring world. Week by week, day by day, we can thank God for the hope and love He brings.

Join us in singing of carols and celebrating Jesus' birth in any of the many Christmas services - you will be most welcome. He came for

all of us: the weary and the energetic, the broken hearted and the happy, the young, the old and all in-between. To appreciate this in amongst the presents, cards and food makes Christmas more significant. John Betjeman puts it beautifully in his poem 'Christmas'.

No love that in a family dwells No caroling in frosty air Nor all the steeple shaking bells Can with this single truth compare That God was Man in Palestine And lives today in bread and wine.

The Remembrance Day service was held at the War Memorial on a cold and sunny autumn day. Clare led the solemn service, Peter Rogerson read the roll of honour, during which schoolchildren from Otley planted a poppy cross for each of the forty names, and Brian Childs read the lesson. The Exhortation was spoken by Aubrey James (ex Marine Commandos) and the Kohima Epitaph by Lieut.Col. Geoffrey Mason (ex Queen's Royal Surrey Regt.). Last Post and Reveille were sounded by James Symington. a trumpeter from the Ipswich Hospital Band, who is going to study at Kneller Hall, the Army School of Music. Wreaths were laid on behalf of the Parish Council, St Mary's Church, the 1st Otley Scout Group, The Royal British Legion, the Bowls Club, the Friendship Club, and the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment. The Scouts and Cubs were on parade and they lowered their banners as a mark of respect during the two-minute silence. Helen Jay led the music, playing the keyboard, with Olivia Bullock on flute and James Symington on trumpet, and Mike Bullock provided the public address system. It was an impressive service in the centre of the village, as part of the national Remembrance, and thank you to everybody who took part. We don't yet know the final result of the Poppy Appeal, but it will be over £700, and Victoria Hook would like to thank all of her poppysellers.

We were glad to welcome a group of youngsters, boys and girls, from the Suffolk Guild of Bellringers, to the church in November. The visit was organised by a boy of 17 and it is encouraging to know that some young people are enthusiastic to take on bell-ringing.

Gardening Club will be meeting on 2nd December when Rebecca Upson, who grew up in Otley, will be speaking about 'Fauna and Flora of the Falkland Islands'. Rebecca spent four years there working for Falklands Conservation, which is linked to the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, and she is now at Kew working on the same project.

The next monthly coffee-morning will be held on Thursday, 12th December at 16 Spring Park, the home of the Upsons. As the church's contribution to the Age UK Suffolk 65 Challenge for Team Otley (see below), we shall be having bring-and-buy book stalls at the next few coffee-mornings, starting with this one, so unwanted books in good condition will be welcome. Otley Primary School to form a formal federation with Witnesham Primary School

Since 2006 Otley and Witnesham schools have been working together and sharing their headteacher, an arrangement that has been working very well. However, schools' governance, financing and expectations have been rapidly changing in the last two or three years and unless schools evolve, there is a danger that they will be left behind and not benefit from the opportunities and benefits currently available. In addition, through its "Raising the Bar " campaign, Suffolk County Council is trying to improve the relatively poor performance of Suffolk's schools when compared to the national picture. Whilst Otley is a good school, we cannot and will not be complacent. We always strive for improvements that will benefit the school and to ensure its long term viability and success. Forming partnerships with other schools is seen as the primary way of achieving this.

With all of this, and more in mind, the governing bodies of Otley and Witnesham have unanimously agreed to a federation of the two schools from 1 April 2014. This will build upon the current collaboration and is a formal legal process. The most obvious difference is that only one governing body will oversee the two schools from that date. We believe that the federation will make the governance and leadership of the schools

more efficient and effective. Pupils and staff will benefit and in the longer term budgetary and succession issues will be easier to resolve. 10% of Suffolk's 350 schools do not have a permanent headteacher.

I have agreed to become the Chair of the combined governing body and to oversee the transition period. It is our aim that the two schools will retain their own identities and it may well be that parents and pupils will see little change in the short term. Many of the changes will be behind the scenes. As part of the federation process, a six week consultation process with all relevant stakeholders will start in early 2014, but if you have any views, comments or general observations to make in the meantime please email me at initialize btinternet.com.

You will need some felt, a needle and thread, fabric glue, ribbon and sequins or buttons for decoration.




